Bonnie Anderson

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



Bonnie Anderson served on the KGI Board of Trustees from 2008 through 2015. She was critical in providing guidance for KGI's modern diagnostics programming and has continued to be a generous philanthropic supporter. She is the President and Chief Executive Officer of Veracyte, a molecular diagnostics company that is pioneering the field of molecular cytology. Her career spans nearly 30 years in regulated diagnostics and life science markets.

Karen Bernstein

CURRENT KGI TRUSTEE



Karen Bernstein has served as a member of the KGI Board of Trustees since 2009. She currently serves on the Executive Committee and was the chair of the Advancement Committee from 2014-2018. Her deep connection to industry has been instrumental in facilitating KGI with introductions to partners and was a proponent of the founding of KGI's School of Pharmacy. As co-founder and chairman of BioCentury, Bernstein oversees the provision of business-oriented information services to a global audience of life science executives and investors from offices in the U.S. and Europe.

Dan Bradbury

CURRENT KGI TRUSTEE AND ADVISORY BOARD MEMBER



Dan Bradbury is a life sciences executive with more than 35 years of experience creating and implementing strategies that transform businesses, bring novel medicines to market, and maximize shareholder value. In 2004, he joined KGI's Advisory Council and joined the Board of Trustees two years later. He has been a strong advocate of and participant in KGI's student mentoring program and supported KGI philanthropically through the Bradbury Endowed Fellowship Fund. A very forward-thinker, he saw the role of pharmacy in the life sciences and was a guiding force in the founding of KGI's School of Pharmacy.

Robert Bradway

FRIEND OF KGI



Robert Bradway is the chairman and chief executive officer at Amgen. He joined Amgen in 2006 as vice president, operations strategy, and served as executive vice president and chief financial officer from April 2007 to May 2010. In October 2011, he was appointed to the Amgen Board of Directors and served as the company's president and chief operating officer from May 2010 to May 2012. He became chief executive officer in May 2012 and chairman in January

2013. Amgen is KGI's number one alumni employer and one of our longest-standing corporate partners, supporting internships, TMPs, and investing philanthropically in our programs from bioprocessing to genetics and genomics. Bradway also served as the keynote speaker at KGI's 15th annual commencement ceremony in 2016.

Bonnie Busenberg

FORMER VICE PRESIDENT FOR ADMINISTRATION



Bonnie Busenberg was KGI's first-ever employee and played a vital role in the founding of the Institute. She was on staff from 1997-2006, eventually serving as Vice-President for Administration. She was also the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees. In the early days, Busenberg oversaw setting up accounts, figuring out the non-profit status, and setting up the founding rules and procedures for the Board of Trustees.

Steve Casper

CURRENT KGI FACULTY AND FORMER DEAN



Dr. Steve Casper joined KGI in July 2003 and is a leading expert on the 'business of science.' He has studied the success and failure of bioscience hubs around the world and is widely published in the fields of economic sociology, international business, and public policy. He is a current faculty member and former dean of the Riggs School. As Dean, he added innovative programs to KGI such as MEng, MSMDE, and PPA. As a professor, he values project-based learning and forming partnerships with companies to give students real-world experience in the bioscience industry.

Marsh Cooper (Posthumous)

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



The late Marsh Cooper was a member of KGI's Board of Trustees from 2000-2013. He was a steadfast supporter of higher education and helped guide the development of KGI since the late 1990's. In recognition of his many contributions to KGI, Cooper was awarded an honorary Doctor of Applied Life Sciences from KGI in 2012. KGI also established the Marsh A. Cooper Laboratories of Bioengineering in his honor. Cooper was a patron-level donor to the inaugural Pioneer Fund and directed a Keck Foundation Founder's Circle gift to the 2002-03 Pioneer Fund.

Bob Curry

KGI BOARD CHAIR EMERITUS AND CURRENT KGI TRUSTEE



Bob Curry is a KGI Board of Trustees member since 2003 and served as Chairman from 2004-2018. He is current Chair Emeritus and has provided guidance and oversight to KGI's academic programs. Prior to the board, Curry was a member of KGI's Advisory Council and co-taught a second-year Entrepreneurship course at KGI. He served as Co-Chair of the 2002-2003 Pioneer Fund, which surpassed its \$450,000 goal with \$455,122 raised. Curry is the former CEO of PerceptiMed and has served as a venture capitalist for numerous companies throughout his career.

Robert Day

FRIEND OF KGI



Robert Day is chairman and chief executive officer of the W.M. Keck Foundation, which helped launch KGI with an initial grant of \$50 million in 1997 and later provided a matching grant of \$20 million in 2005. He is also founder, chairman of the board, and chief executive officer of Trust Company of the West (TCW), an investment management company with an established portfolio of more than \$123 billion. The Keck Foundation's mission is to provide program support for outstanding science, engineering, and medical research in Southern California, with an emphasis on projects that will have a significant impact on complex issues and problems. KGI is honored to have the support and naming of the Keck Foundation.

Gregory Dewey

FORMER KGI DEAN



T. Gregory Dewey was KGI's vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculty. He was, for a time, KGI's longest-serving faculty member and was instrumental in the development of the Institute's groundbreaking curriculum, its world-class faculty, and cutting-edge facilities. Dewey's primary interests were in biophysics and information science as applied to molecular biology. His research included an analysis of molecular evolution using information theory and dynamic modeling of gene expression. He led KGI's academic development and established the first program that took KGI beyond the original MBS program, the Postbaccalaureate Premedical Certificate.

Dennis Fenton

CURRENT KGI ADVISORY BOARD MEMBER AND TRUSTEE EMERITUS



Dennis Fenton served in various roles over his 25-year tenure with Amgen, retiring as Executive Vice President in 2007. He had been serving on KGI's Advisory Council and joined the Board of Trustees from 2004 through 2019. Fenton has been a valued advisor for KGI's programs and a generous philanthropic supporter over many years. He and his wife, Linda Fenton, established a permanent endowment for the George B. and Joy Rathmann Professor and Director of the Amgen Bioprocessing Center at KGI. In 2021, the couple established the Matthew and Kathy Croughan Endowed Scholarship in Bioprocessing to support scholarships for minority women in our MEng program.

David Finegold

FORMER KGI FACULTY



One of KGI's founding faculty members, David Finegold took the lead in developing the strategy, management, and business ethics curriculum while at KGI. He taught courses on Managing Life Sciences Companies and Designing High-Performance Organizations. He conducted research, published, consulted, and provided executive education and coaching to public and private sector organizations on issues about designing effective organizations.

Bob (Posthumous) and Bette Finnigan

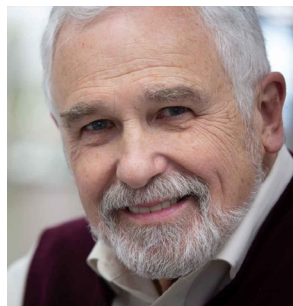
FRIENDS OF KGI

CURRENT KGI TRUSTEE AND FORMER ADVISORY BOARD MEMBER



Dr. Ross Grossman served as a KGI Advisory Board member from 2006-2012 before joining the Board of Trustees in 2013. He also chaired the Personnel and Compensation Committee from 2013-2019. As a first-generation college student himself, Grossman is passionate about creating opportunities for more diverse populations to pursue careers in the life sciences. He was the Chief Human Resources Officer at Regeneron Pharmaceuticals from 2002 until his retirement in 2013, later returning to that role in April 2015 until his second retirement in May 2016. He previously held senior Human Resources roles at Novartis Pharmaceuticals, Prudential Financial, and UBS.

Judy Heyboer

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



Judy Heyboer is KGI trustee emeritus. She served on the board from 2004 through 2013 and again from 2018-2019. She is an Executive Coach and Human Resources Consultant, formerly serving as Senior Vice President of Human Resources at Genentech. Prior to Genentech, Heyboer spent 13 years at Acuson Corporation as Senior Vice President, after having begun her career at Spectra-Physics. She has been a phenomenal coach to KGI leadership from a human resources perspective and has been generous with her time and wisdom in organizational behavior.

Alice Huang

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



Dr. Alice Huang was a member of the KGI Board of Trustees from 1998-2007. She was very supportive of innovation and provided guidance and advice to KGI in the early days, especially understanding the areas where KGI should focus. She is an international consultant on science policy, higher education, and career development. Her past board appointments include UMass, Johns Hopkins, and the Rockefeller Foundation. She has worked with science institutions in Singapore, China, Japan, and Portugal, among others. She was elected president of the American Society for Microbiology and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

FORMER KGI DEAN



Dr. David Lawrence is the former Dean of KGI's School of Community Medicine. In his time at KGI, he was instrumental in developing the Master of Science in Community Medicine program, which is key to a vision of creating a more equitable healthcare system that meets the needs of all citizens—particularly those living in underserved communities. This passion for creating opportunities for diverse populations to pursue careers in health will have a long-standing impact on future KGI students and the community.

John Maguire (Posthumous)

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



The late John Maguire served as a charter trustee at KGI. He knew his way around academia better than anyone and encouraged KGI's innovation, especially within The Claremont Colleges. He was a trusted advisor at a critical time in KGI's infancy and development. He was President Emeritus from Claremont Graduate University, serving as the longest-tenured president in CGU history from 1981 to 1998.

Angelika Niemz

CURRENT KGI FACULTY



Dr. Angelika Niemz has provided guidance and oversight to KGI's academic programs since joining the Institute in February 2002 as an Assistant Professor. She became Associate Professor in 2008 and began serving as Director of Research at KGI and was named the Arnold and Mabel Beckman Professor in 2009. She was promoted to Chair of Business and Bioengineering for the Riggs School in March 2021.

Harlyne Norris (Posthumous)

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



The late Harlyne Norris was a member of KGI's President's Council and Board of Trustees. She was passionate about women and minorities in the sciences and minority education. She was a Trustee of The Kenneth T. and Eileen L. Norris Foundation, which was one of KGI's earliest supporters. The Foundation provided funding for KGI's Center for Rare Disease Therapies, the Norris Endowed Professor, and the refurbishment of Founder's Room. Grant funding continues to support the Summer Undergraduate Research Experience program.

Stan Phelps (Posthumous)

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



The late Stan Phelps is a KGI Trustee Emeritus and served as a member of the Campaign Leadership Committee, Investment Committee, and Development & External Relations Committee. A generous philanthropist and supporter of science and science education, Phelps established the Henry E. Riggs Professor of Management endowment at KGI and contributed an additional \$1 million toward the \$20 million matching grant from the W.M. Keck Foundation.

Ian Phillips

KGI PROFESSOR EMERITUS



Dr. Ian Phillips, KGI Professor Emeritus, has been a key part of KGI's history with his contributions to education, research, and community. He joined the Institute in 2006 and founded the Postbaccalaureate Premedical Certificate and Master of Science in Applied Life Sciences programs. His contribution to research in the field of rare diseases has made an impact on patients and families affected by those illnesses which desperately need more attention.

Art Riggs (Posthumous)

FORMER KGI TRUSTEE



The late Dr. Arthur Riggs served on the Board of Trustees from 2005 to 2022. Riggs was passionate about KGI's programs and how the Institute is changing the world of life sciences and healthcare education. In addition to helping guide the Institute, Riggs was a generous philanthropic supporter of our programs and students. He was a world-renowned diabetes expert who developed the technology that led to the first human synthetic insulin for treating diabetes. His significant scientific discoveries paved the way for developing the monoclonal antibody therapies that are the foundation of modern treatments for cancer, autoimmune diseases, blindness, and other diseases.

Hank (Posthumous) and Gayle Riggs

FOUNDING KGI PRESIDENT AND HIS WIFE



The late Hank Riggs was the founder of KGI. His vision gave KGI its character as a transformative graduate educational institution of a unique flavor in the nation. His insights in uniting the diverse themes of biotechnology with a generalist's education in science, business, and ethics are what made KGI the institution we currently have. Gayle Riggs was very actively involved in the founding of KGI, providing support to Hank and his cabinet during the early KGI years. In 2019, KGI opened the Gayle Riggs Student Center in her honor. Gayle Riggs and family have continued to be generous philanthropic supporters of KGI's programs and students.

David Sadava

FORMER KGI ADVISORY COUNCIL MEMBER



Dr. David Sadava's affiliation with KGI began in 1997 when he became a member of KGI's Advisory Council. He played an essential role in delivering KGI's curriculum with his background filling lectures in biology. Sadava was the architect of the joint degree program between Claremont McKenna College and KGI and was an essential advisor to establishing a similar program between KGI and Harvey Mudd College.

Jil and Jack Stark

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



Jack Stark is former Chair and Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees of KGI. He is President Emeritus of Claremont McKenna College, having led CMC for 29 remarkable years of growth, financial development, and enhanced quality and reputation. He holds a Doctorate of Applied Life Sciences, honoris causa, from Keck Graduate Institute, as well as four other honorary degrees. Jil is a Scripps alum and joined Jack in supporting KGI from the very beginning. Jim Sterling

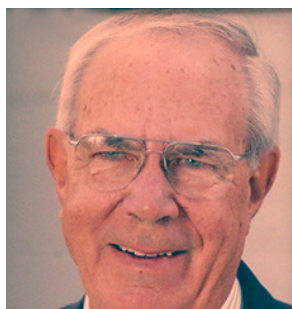
CURRENT KGI FACULTY AND FORMER DEAN



Dr. James Sterling joined KGI as a founding faculty member in 2000 and helped develop the initial curriculum that prepared students to work in the applied life sciences. He led the development of the first bioengineering lab at KGI and directed the Team Master's Project program from 2004-2010. Sterling served as Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Faculty at KGI from 2009-2014. From 2013-2015, he joined Minerva University (formerly the Minerva Schools at KGI) serving as the founding Interim Dean of the College of Natural Sciences and the Director of Minerva Labs.

Bob Tranquada

KGI TRUSTEE EMERITUS



Dr. Robert E. Tranquada was a founding member of KGI's Board of Trustees. He is Emeritus Professor of Medicine and Public Policy, University of Southern California. He is former chair of the Board of Overseers of Claremont University Consortium and Chair Emeritus of the Board of Trustees at Pomona College. It was Bob who suggested to Hank Riggs to establish an institution in the life sciences, because as a physician and MPH, he saw the importance of closing the gap of "bench to bedside".

Kathy Webster (Posthumous)

FORMER KGI DEAN



The late Kathy Webster was the founding dean of KGI's School of Pharmacy and Health Sciences. She developed a novel curriculum in the world of pharmacy education and was looked up to and respected by faculty and students alike. She built the foundation for KGI's health sciences programs, which continue to grow and serve her legacy.

Jim Weinberg (Posthumous)

FORMER KGI TRUSTEE AND BOARD CHAIR



The late Sidney J. "Jim" Weinberg Jr. was the founding chair and chair emeritus of the KGI Board of Trustees. He was a generous philanthropist and supporter of higher education who assisted KGI in numerous ways, from the Institute's earliest days through its development into a premier academic institution, including helping establish 10 endowed scholarships through a challenge grant of \$2.5 million from his foundation. In recognition of his many contributions to KGI, Weinberg was presented with an honorary Doctor of Applied Life Sciences from KGI in 2007.

Jim Widergren

CURRENT KGI BOARD CHAIR



James F. Widergren has been KGI Board Chair since January 1, 2019. He served as a member of the Board of Trustees since 2012 and was the Finance Committee Chair during that time.
